Why did you choose to ride at GMTRC? At first I didn't think I could do it, but I have always had a love of horses and always wanted to ride a horse. So this was an opportunity to learn more about horses and interact with them in a safe environment.

Why did you decide to do the horsemanship clinics in addition to riding? Schooling Riders: Thank you, Ellen!

The Board and Staff of GMTRC wish to thank Ellen Barnes for over 10 years of service directing GMTRC's schooling program. In February 2020, Ellen will step down and a new coordinator will take over. Ellen shared her rich GMTRC history and experience with us during an interview.

When did you join GMTRC as an employee? I started volunteering in 1993, became an instructor in 1995, was head instructor from the spring of 1997 through December 2008 and returned to being an instructor in 2009.

When did you start directing the schooling program at GMTRC? I believe it was fall of 2009. I moved my own horse Jax, to Greystone and it was part of the agreement I made with the Board of Directors to start a schooling program along with paying board. We were riding in January of 2010 for sure!

Do you have any specific schooling memories you can share? When we were in the early days of schooling, we did a lot of drill teamwork in pairs. We had a large number of horses and riders working at the same time in limited space- this allowed us to work together to adjust pace as we have a variety of sizes of horses and ponies working together. When the rider skill and horse soundness allowed, we did Walk, Trot, Canter patterns. It is very rewarding to see a group of horses and ponies moving in harmony at varying gaits and directions on a pattern.

Tell us about how you started the schooling program. When I started schooling there was no planned group riding except instructors; it was inconsistent. I offered to coordinate a group ride for select volunteers to exercise the horses weekly, with goals of both improving our horses fitness, flexibility, etc. and increasing our volunteers' skills around horses. At the time it was considered unsafe to school during therapeutic riding lessons, so we set up Friday evenings-the only weekday our horses were not in classes. I set up the protocol for volunteers to become approved schooling riders. There are currently 15 volunteers approved in addition to instructors. We typically have a core group of about 6 riders currently on the evenings I coordinate; few people in school or working full time are able to come every single week.

What will you miss about schooling on Friday nights? I very much enjoyed seeing the special bonds developed between horse and rider as the horses taught riders better, kinder and more effective horsemanship skills. Seeing the improvement in not only riding, but also all horse-related skills bettered the program as well as the volunteers and helped our horses by being more consistent.


The schooling program is designed to keep GMTRC's therapeutic program horses as physically and mentally fit as much as possible by including an "able-bodied" rider to their schedule. Our INCREDIBLE Volunteers!

In 2019, over 150 volunteers donated a total of 12,051 recorded hours to GMTRC. 

GMTRC is looking a little brighter thanks to the 140 new energy saving bulbs installed by Troy Hess, winner of the 2019 GMTRC Teddy Award. In addition to giving more light to barn, the bulbs are designed to save on GMTRC's energy costs.

Wintertime at the barn can be challenging. Our horses require proper ventilation so volunteers need to dress in layers to stay warm and wear footwear that has good traction to walk through snow and ice to and from the pastures. Yaktrax shoe products can be helpful for traction.

Our farrier has fitted our horses with snow pads, which help in preventing snow/ice build up and then walking in snowballs.
