
## **Honoring Our Heroes**

This program, designed specifically for individuals 55-years and older, promotes physical, intellectual, and personal growth, as well a positive community connection. Throughout the four-week course, participants experienced the incredible bond that can be built between horses and humans, all while learning the basics of horse behavior and handling. Needless to say, the program was a big hit! With a successful year under our belt, our staff at GMTRC said, "why stop there?"

As a result, "Silver Saddles 2.0" was born! Silver Saddles 2.0 is an extension of the original program, allowing participants to expand and build on the knowledge and skills developed in the original program. Our pilot series has just ended, and we are delighted at the growth that the participants have experienced in just four short weeks. So, on the heels of success, our staff have once again said, "why stop there?"



# Nathan's Great Milestone: 40 Years of Riding!

Nathan Buckwalter is celebrating 40 years of therapeutic riding in 2022! His family is excited to share his story and experiences leading up to this incredible milestone!

Tell us about
Nathan: Nathan was
born February 2,
1978, and two years
later, we were told he
has Cerebral Palsy.
Nathan never let his
disability get in the
way. After
"graduating" from
Easter Seals (E.S.),
he went to the
Worship Center for his
elementary years,
followed by Ephrata

Junior High and Lancaster Mennonite High School, where he graduated in 1997. Nathan joined as many clubs and activities as he could. His all-time favorite activity was Challenger Baseball. Nathan has always been involved in a church, has been in the youth group, and has helped with a youth ministry. He now attends Victory Church near his home, where he helps with the kids' ministry.

One year after graduating high school, the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation selected Nathan to participate in a nine-month program at the Hiram G. Andrews Rehab Center in Johnstown, where he learned how to be a cashier and drive an adaptive car. He was then employed by McDonalds of Ephrata and transferred to Greenfield. He worked at the Greenfield McDonald's for 13 years until he was replaced by a kiosk! He now volunteers at Blessings of Hope, a food bank ministry in Leola. In 2000 Nathan moved to Lancaster with a buddy in a bachelor pad!

**How long as Nathan been riding at GMTRC?** Nathan has been riding with this program since Spring 1982. So, as of March 2022, Nathan has been riding for 40 years!

How did you first learn about the program and get started? He was enrolled in Easter Seals (now Schreiber Center for Pediatric Development) and when he was 3 years old, we found out about a therapeutic riding program through E.S. in Quarryville. I would drop him off at E.S. and he would get on a bus with an attendant and go to the riding program. We then found out about a program that Carol Henkel had started and we signed up for that program (which is now GMTRC).

How has therapeutic riding and GMTRC impacted Nathan? Nathan gets so many benefits from riding. He tends to be tight due to his Cerebral Palsy and getting on the horse to ride helps him with stretching. GMTRC's program is a fun companion to traditional therapy. Getting out and meeting people at GMTRC is something he enjoys.

What are your favorite things about the program? Nathan says "I love the horses and their different personalities and the wonderful staff and volunteers. I am grateful for the lift." Parents Ray and Nancy add, "We are blown away by the dedication of the board" [both Ray & Nancy were both board members at one time]. "The dedication of the staff and many volunteers are a bunch of special people. We have met so many wonderful people through the years."

What advice would you give to someone who is considering starting therapeutic riding or therapeutic equine assisted activities? It is a wonderful program and we have heard so many accomplishments of riders through the years. Nate's physical therapists have already noticed a change in Nathan since he started riding again in the spring.

Why should the community support GMTRC? It is an expensive program to operate and does so much good for many types of disabilities. The community needs to support GMTRC.

Two months later, I made the connection. My dad was a sidewalker for Nathan Buckwalter in the 1990s—the same rider who is profiled in this issue. Last year, my dad found a photo from his volunteer days. When I showed it to Nathan, he smiled. Connections between riders/participants and their volunteers can last a lifetime



## From The Barn: Terri, Lisa, and Troy

GMTRC has been making some improvements at the barn thanks to generous contributions of two local charitable foundations.

Millcreek Fence & Decks, LLC installed a new fence and gate in Pasture "B" thanks to a generous grant from the Robert J. Gunterberg Charitable Foundation. The fence allows GMTRC's staff to better control the horses' grazing habits, which is critical to their overall health.

The Clark Associates Charitable Foundation recently made a



grant to replace 15 stall windows that were over 60 years old. The new DuraWeld series vinyl windows, installed by Choice Home Remodeling, will protect our horses while they are resting in their stalls.

GMTRC is still seeking additional funding to complete the
