

Volunteer Spotlight: Jeremy Giffin & Megan Venerick-Giffin

Megan Venerick-Giffin and Jeremy Giffin are faithful GMTRC volunteers since 2017. They help with barn duty and hay delivery. They also have their own barn full of horses, including GMTRC's retired pony, Wiz!

Q: How did you learn about GMTRC?

A: Jeremy works in the area, so we drove by the barn frequently but had no idea it was a therapeutic riding facility. Once we looked into it and saw that there was a need for volunteers, it seemed like a perfect fit for us.

Q: When did you (and Jeremy) become volunteers? A: We've been volunteering since 2017.

Q: What activities do you do in the barn?

A: I help with morning barn duty three times a week.

Q: What about this experience has been rewarding for you?

A: There are many aspects of volunteering that have been rewarding for me over the years, but in particular, I love caring for the horses and getting to know their individual personalities, their likes and dislikes, and all of their little quirks. Since I do not help with lessons, I have also especially enjoyed helping with the horse show and witnessing the connections between the riders and horses and seeing how much joy it brings the riders.

Q: Why did you decide to continue volunteering at GMTRC after you moved to Harrisburg?

A: Although the distance is challenging at times, it would be very difficult for me to leave behind the horses that I have grown to love and the friendships I have made over the years.

Q: What would you say to someone who is considering becoming a volunteer at GMTRC?

A: Give it a try! Because there are so many different ways to volunteer, you can try different activities to find out what you like to do. It is such a rewarding experience in many regards, and it offers a way to escape the stresses of work and daily life while making a positive contribution to a wonderful program.

Q: How did you come to own Wiz and how is he doing?

A: All of our horses are rescues that needed a soft place to land where they can spend the rest of their days as companions. So when Wiz needed a retirement home, we figured he would fit in well with our herd and made room for one more. He is loving retirement; he is deeply devoted to our mare, kicks up his heels with the boys from time to time, and still engages in mischief every chance he gets!

Participant Spotlight: Brittany Hershey, MSW



Brittany, a hospital social worker, joined the first session of Heroes and Horses that started in October 2023. This program is dedicated to providing *free* group intervention to individuals who work in the medical field or first responder field and experienced trauma during their COVID-19 experiences.

Q: What about this program made you want to participate?

A: Coming home to my dog and cat after a stressful day has always had a calming effect on me. Animals have an

incredible way of making someone feel at ease. When this program became available, I was so excited to have the opportunity to work alongside horses and to also experience another form of intervention other than traditional therapy.

Q: How did COVID-19 affect your career?

A: As a hospital social worker, we already have a limited number of resources to work with and availability within these resources change constantly. During COVID, the need was even higher, but the supply was even more limited than before. Working in health care, social workers are responsible for helping to address the social needs of the patient and working to overcome these barriers that they may have. When the resources are not there, this leads to even greater frustration, and we tend to be one of the main targets. This has led even more to higher burn out and feelings of defeat.

Q: How is this program different than other interventions available?

A: Working with animals! Although medication and individual therapy can be helpful, I was really looking for something where I could connect but not necessarily have to talk. I work with clients daily and as much as I love it, I like to be able to sometimes not talk but still be able to work through emotions. Heroes and Horses has been a wonderful way for me to experience that. It is almost that my horse and I can look at each other and just know. It's such a cool feeling!

Q: What do you enjoy most about this program?

A: I have learned so much about horses in the short time with being in the program. Although I have always loved horses, I still had some



intimidation around them due to their size since I didn't know much about them. With the education that has been provided by the staff, it has given me much more confidence with being around them. I have loved getting to work with Emmit and his quirky personality. It has also forced me to be at ease during the program since I have learned that the horses really do follow your energy.

Q: What would you say to someone considering this program?

A: Absolutely do it! I don't typically look forward to "most interventions" and this is something I look forward to every single week and will be super sad when it is over. It is a great way for someone to be able to feel at ease and de-stress from the day, and not have to do a lot of talking!

Q: How do you plan to apply what you have learned to your daily life?

A: It has been a great reminder how your energy goes a long way with communication. What you say can be interpreted very differently depending on your tone and movement. I do also want to try and still be able to connect with horses even after the program is over.

Q: Tell us something interesting about this experience:

A: The horses are so amazing and hysterical. It is fun coming into the barn and seeing the horses and their personalities. My project horse, Emmit, I felt as though we connected right from the start and he is a hoot. He is newer to Greystone Manor and I believe he will do very well. When I reflect on it, I was instantly drawn to Emmit for his outgoing personality and "class clown" mannerisms. I believe this is due to my personality as well. He is a horse that wants to get his point across but will then lay his head on your shoulder to take a nap. I was able to see a lot of similarities between Emmit and myself and I believe this is why I was able to bond with him well. One of my favorite activities we did was both an art project and to get the horses to move in certain directions with just our body language. That was super cool to see!

Heroes and Horses is a <u>free</u> group program providing mental health intervention to medical professionals and first responders.
